The dream

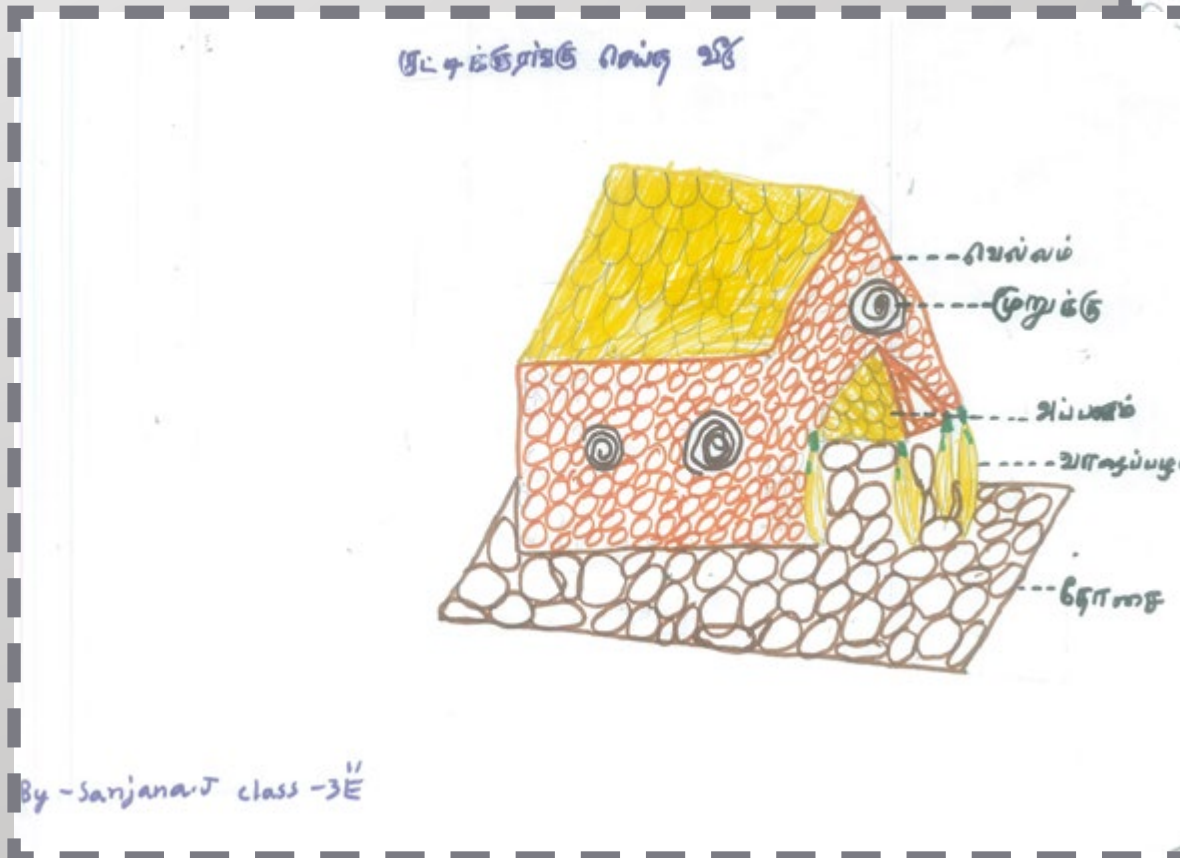

Oldest Human Fossil

Hundreds of thousands of years ago, around 62 miles west of what would eventually become Marrakesh, a group of people lived in a cave overlooking a lush Moroccan landscape. They rested there, building fires to keep themselves warm. They hunted there, sharpening stone tools to bring down animals. And they died there, leaving their bones behind in the dirt.

That cave is now called Jebel Irhoud, and bones of its former occupants have been recently unearthed by an international team of scientists. They mark the earliest fossilized remains of Homo sapiens ever found.

Jebel Irhoud rose to prominence in 1961, when miners turned the site into a quarry. They were looking for barite minerals, but to their surprise, they found a fossilized skull. Soon, they disinterred more bones: another skull, a child's jaw, and fragments of arm bones and hips. And after a few seasons of digging, they found some—a partial skull, fragments of facial bones, a nearly complete adult jawbone, and other bits and pieces from at

least five individuals.

These people had very similar faces to today's humans, albeit with slightly more prominent brows. But the backs of their heads were very different. Our skulls are rounded globes, but theirs were lower on the top and longer at the back. If you saw them face on, they could pass for a modern human. But they turned around, you'd be looking at a skull that's closer to extinct hominids like Homo erectus.

Animals of the Amazon

Here's some exciting news for animal lovers. In recent times, upto 381 new species have been discovered in the Amazon, including a strong-beaked bird named after Barack Obama, a fire-tailed titi monkey and a new pink river dolphin. These species are among species recorded by the Living Amazon Initiative of the WWF Network. Here's a glimpse of some of them...

* Roadside pond fish, *Papiliolebias ashleyae*, was discovered in Santa Cruz, Bolivia – the only known location where the species occurs.

* A nocturnal species was found on the Xingu river in Brazil and is known locally as white-ball acari due to its dark grey colouring and large white spots.

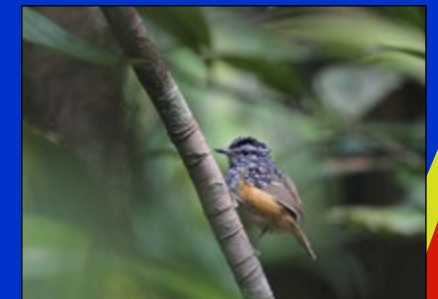
* A new species of pink river dolphin, *Inia araguaiaensis*, was discovered in 2014,

thanks to the analysis of carcasses found in the Araguaia river basin in Brazil.

* The fire-tailed titi monkey, or Milton's titi, a beautiful monkey from the southern Amazon, was first recorded in 2010. The monkey owes its name to its long bright orange tail.

* The summit of the Muri-sipán-tepui in Venezuela is some 2,400 metres high and has a climate that is virtually inaccessible for numerous species. Only one reptile species had been discovered here by 2015 when the gymnophthalmid lizard *Riolama inopinata* was first described.

* A small bird with well-defined colours, the name manicoré warbling-antbird, *Hypocnemis rondoni*, was given as a tribute to the Brazilian anthropologist Marechal Cândido Mariano da Silva Rondon. The orange-tinted hue of its belly contrasts with its black-and-white chest and head.



The Tale of Two Galaxies

That's what you – or most probably your descendants will hear when the much awaited collision of the Andromeda and Milky Way galaxies will occur, leaving our fate in the hands of the stars.

The Andromeda Galaxy is a neighbouring spiral galaxy, approximately 2.5 million light years from the Milky Way, containing around one trillion stars. It has been recognized as one of the galaxies with the most dark matter. It is comparatively larger than the Milky Way, which has only four hundred billion stars. The Andromeda galaxy is among the brightest of the Messier Objects, making it visible to the naked eye.

The Milky Way is pretty boring – its small, insignificant and unimportant in outer space. But it is about to get whole lot bigger as the Andromeda galaxy crashes into it. The Andromeda galaxy is heading towards the Milky Way at 110 kilometres every second.

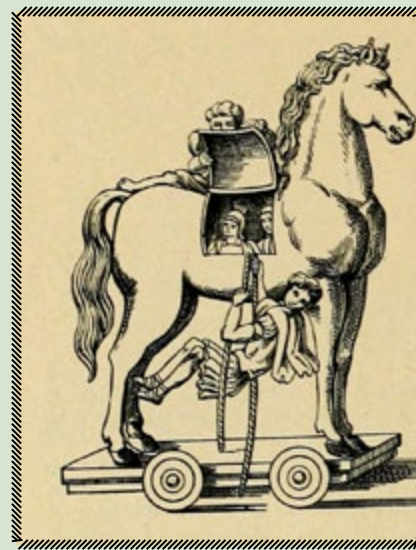

THAI SEAFOOD SOUP – TOM YUM SOUP

Ingredients:

Squid- 50 grams squid chopped
fish - 50 grams boneless
chopped
shrimp - 50 grams
clams(optional_ - 25 grams
orange leaves -5
lemon leaves - 5
lemon grass - 10 grams
tamarind - 15 grams
lemon - 1

ginger - 10 grams chopped
tomatoes - 3
Fish sauce (to taste)
Soy sauce (to taste)
Vinegar (to taste)
Chilli sauce (to taste)
garlic - 5 cloves minced
green chillis -2
Chilli flakes
Salt (to taste)
Pepper (to taste)
Sesame oil

Method:

1. Blanch the tomatoes till skin easily peels off.
2. Peel the tomatoes and blend them a little.
3. Soak the tamarind in water
4. Slightly crush the leaves and ginger
5. Sauté the leaves, ginger, and garlic in sesame oil
6. Then add the meats.
7. Add the fish sauce, soy sauce, vinegar, chilli sauce, green chillies, chilli flakes, salt, pepper and sauté the mixture
8. Add the blanched tomatoes and stir well.
9. Pour in the tamarind juice and water and let it simmer till it is cooked.
10. Finally, squeeze the lemon on it.

TEMPURA FRIED ICE CREAM

Ingredients:

serving: 6
1 litre ice cream
610g of pound cake
1 cup of flour
1 egg
1 cup cold water
oil for frying



Method:

1. Scoop out 6 balls of ice cream onto a parchment paper-lined baking sheet, and freeze for at least an hour or until firm.
2. Slice pound cake into 1-2 inch slices.
3. Lay 3 slices of pound cake on a plastic wrap side by side and flatten with a rolling pin.
4. Wrap frozen ice cream ball in pound cake so it is fully enclosed.
5. Freeze for at least an hour, or until firm.
6. Make tempura batter by mixing flour, egg and water.
7. Heat oil in a pan.
8. Coat the wrapped ice cream in tempura batter.
9. Carefully lower the coated ice cream into the oil and cook until golden brown (15 to 30 seconds). Do not cook for too long or else the ice cream will melt.

Serve immediately with your choice of toppings.

STUFFED BAKED POTATO (Servings for 3)

Potpourri

Ingredients:

Russet potatoes -3
Olive oil- 2 tablespoons
Cream cheese - 114g cream cheese*
Cheddar cheese, plus more for topping - 1 cup
broccoli - ½ cup chopped
Salt- 2 teaspoons
Pepper 1 teaspoon
Milk - ¼ cup
Sour cream, to serve
Chives (to serve)



Method:

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F/180°C
2. Carefully pierce potatoes with a fork. On a baking sheet, oil the potatoes well and sprinkle with salt.
3. Bake for about an hour. If you are preparing more potatoes, an additional 15 minutes is needed per potato.
4. Once cooled, cut the potatoes vertically, scoop out the inside, and transfer them to a bowl.
5. In the bowl with the scooped out potatoes, add the cream cheese, cheddar cheese, broccoli, salt, pepper, and milk. Mix well.
6. Scoop the potato mixture back into the potatoes and top with cheddar cheese.
7. Bake an additional 15 minutes until the cheese melts.
8. Serve warm with sour cream and chives.

* (For making cream cheese, just grind panner till it looks like cream cheese.,You can use it for any recipe)

 4. Microwave the curd for 30 seconds.
 5. Mix the curd and the rest of the wt ingredients mentioned in Step 3.
 6. Mix the dry and wet ingredients.
 7. Make a few balls of the dough and lay them on a greased baking tray.
 8. Bake for 20 minutes.

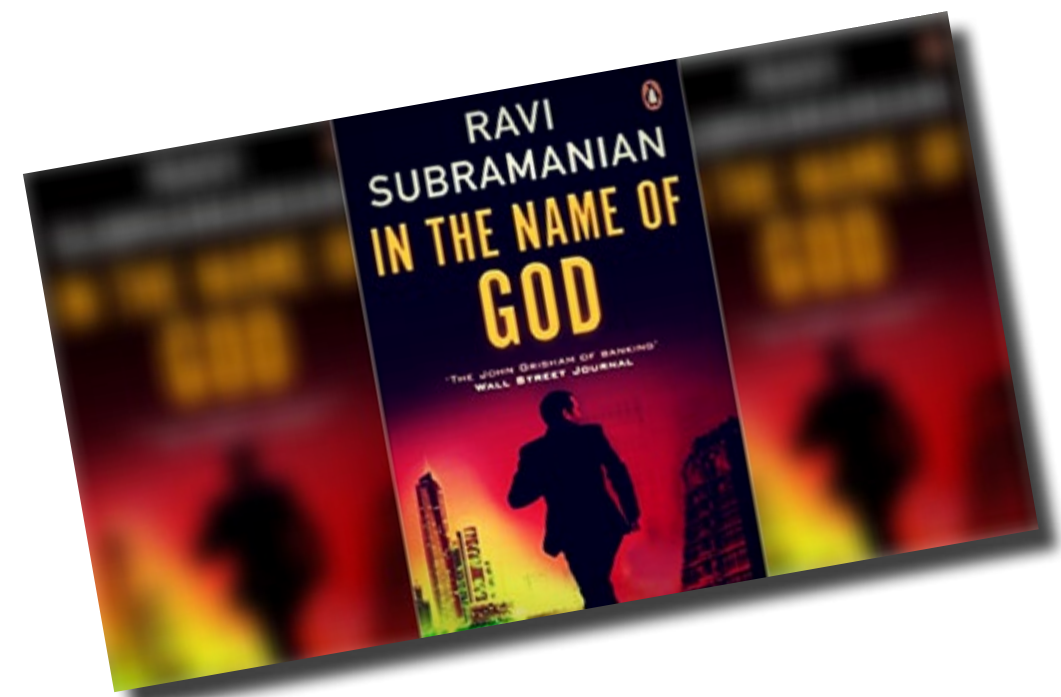
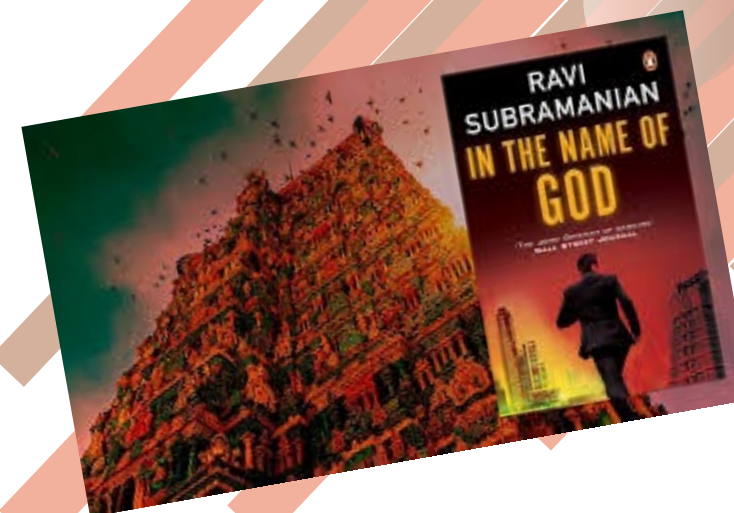
