Greetings from your humble senior. Having taken the traditional STEM subjects in the Cambridge curriculum, I had the opportunity to explore the true nature of these commonly chosen fields of study and debunk the many myths that surround them. Due to the vast amount of experience, I have accumulated as a result, I will limit myself to advice on the subject of mathematics alone.

Mathematics at the IGCSE level lends itself to act as a smooth transition to high school mathematics - scratching deeper into whatever surfaces were touched upon in geometry, algebra and reasoning in 8th grade. The topics may seem straightforward, but the board exam questions aim to assess your ability to apply mathematical principles by featuring rather creative questions. It is essential to practice as many past papers as possible after understanding the topics thoroughly.

Dedicating a few hours each week to imbibe the contents of these neatly divided topics and practicing at least a paper a week will take you lengths. Review a chapter a day 2 weeks prior to your boards. Rewards of this course are innumerable - all you have to do in university is remember these fundamentals and add more icing on top of this cake of knowledge! All in all, mathematics in this Cambridge curriculum will leave you with a solid and sound mathematical sense and a sharp acumen for anything mathematical in your career. And this is for sure useful as mathematics is everywhere!

The positives of history :

You learn about the histories of various countries, each of them having great significance to the timeline that we currently are in. For example, we learn about the Russian Revolution in AS History, which still has left Russia wounded today when we think about the current regime's ambitions. One can easily connect these to present-day happenings, and what precedents we may take to stop them. A2 History exposes us to the Holocaust, and we now know never to take hate to such an egregious level to kill people systematically as it happened.

The negatives of history:

Possibly a drawback would be the relative amount of motivation required to succeed in this subject compared to other more 'mainstream subjects'. Resources may be fewer than in the staple sciences, and generally, the learning curve is a lot harder. There is also the inevitable complaint about the content being 'boring'.

Recommendations while studying History:

Probably the most important thing when studying history is to be genuinely interested and curious when delving into events. For example, when we study Hitler for A2, ask: why did he pass this policy? What were his underlying aims for doing so, and what did he want to get out of it? This analytical train of thought, which one can represent through notes and mind maps, allows one to really grasp the core ideas in a planned-out way.

Final advice for juniors:

Being in my final year of school, it is hard not to mention how stressful things are getting for us students. Despite this, there is a lot to look forward to always dream big and keep questioning anything you see. Stay enthusiastic, and cherish the moments you have now. A positive mindset always helps, as I can personally attest in the midst of an incoming slew of exams!




