# Potpourri

#### **Pancakes**

#### Instructions:

- Mix Dry Ingredients: In a bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt.
- Add Wet Ingredients: Pour in the milk, add the egg, and stir until just combined. Then mix in the melted butter or oil. Avoid overmixing; small lumps are fine.
- Cook the Pancakes: Heat a non-stick skillet or griddle over medium heat. Lightly grease it with butter or oil.
- Pour the Batter: Scoop about 1/4 cup of batter onto the skillet for each pancake.
- Flip: Cook until bubbles form on the surface (about 2 to 3 minutes), then flip and cook the other side for another 1-2 minutes.
- Serve: Enjoy your pancakes plain, or top them with syrup, butter, or your favourite fruits.

1 cup (125g) all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons sugar (optional) 1 teaspoon baking powder A pinch of salt 3/4 cup (180ml) milk 1 egg 2 tablespoons melted butter or oil

#### Cheesecake

#### Instructions:

#### Prepare the Base:

Crush the biscuits into fine crumbs using a food processor. Mix the crumbs with the melted butter until evenly coated.

Press the mixture firmly into the bottom of a springform pan or any dish to form the base. Chill in the fridge for 10–15 minutes.

#### Make the Filling:

In a bowl, beat the cream cheese and powdered sugar together until smooth and creamy.

Fold in the whipped cream and vanilla extract (if using) until fully combined. Assemble the Cheesecake:

Spread the cream cheese mixture evenly over the chilled biscuit base. Smooth the top with a spatula.

#### Chill:

Refrigerate the cheesecake for at least 4 hours or until firm. Overnight is best for optimal texture.

#### Serve:

Carefully remove from the pan and slice.

Optionally, top with fruit, jam, or chocolate sauce before serving.

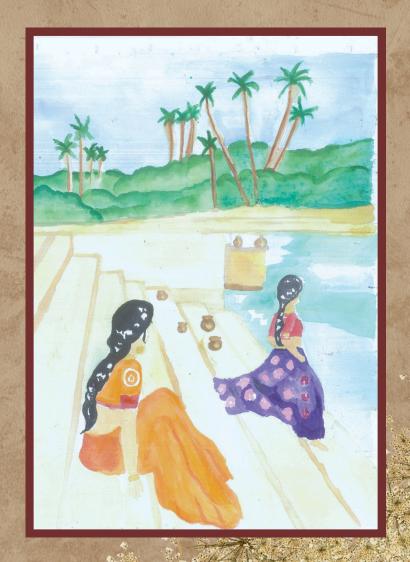
- 200g (about 2 cups) digestive biscuits or graham crackers

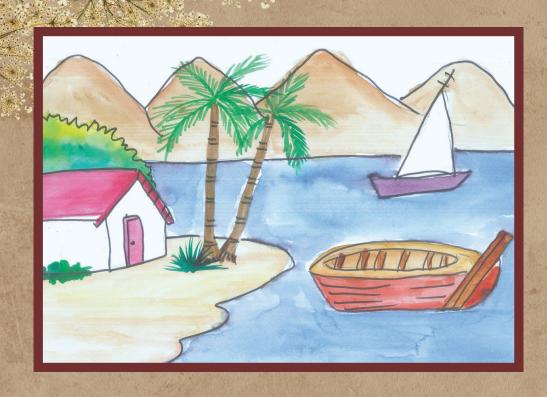

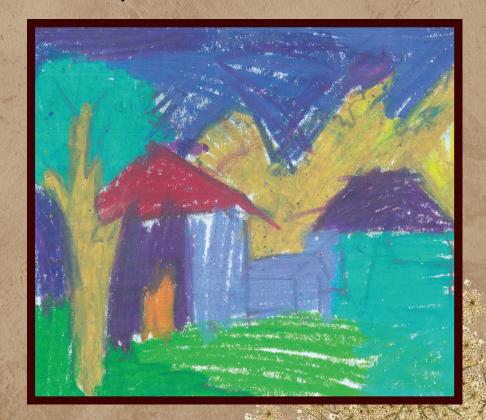

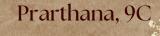
#### Teacher interview

Holes by Louis Sachar tells the story of Stanley Yelnats, a boy sent to a juvenile detention camp called Camp Green Lake. Despite its name, the camp is a barren, dried-up lake where kids are forced to dig holes every day. While it seems pointless at first, the digging hides a deeper mystery tied to the camp's history.

The book cleverly weaves together three narratives: Stanley's present-day struggles, his family's history of bad luck, and a legend involving a curse. These seemingly separate stories connect surprisingly and satisfyingly by the end.

The characters are memorable, with Stanley as a relatable underdog and Zero, his quiet but resilient friend, playing a pivotal role. Even the villains, like the sinister Warden and Mr. Sir, are intriguingly written.

The song became charted number one in many different countries leading it to become nominated for many important titles.

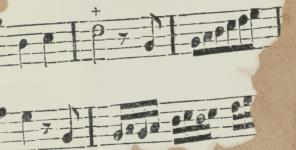


#### Music review

# Extinction of animals in the Nilgiri district

Human activities are pushing many species in the Nilgiri Hills, a biodiversity hotspot in southern India, toward extinction. The Nilgiri Biosphere Reserve is home to a wide range of flora and fauna, including endangered species like the Nilgiri Tahr, tigers, elephants, and various endemic plants. Unfortunately, human encroachment and exploitation are threatening this fragile ecosystem.

Deforestation is one of the primary causes of habitat destruction. Large areas of forest have been cleared for agriculture, tea plantations, and urban expansion. This has led to the fragmentation of habitats, isolating wildlife populations and reducing their chances of survival.

Poaching and illegal hunting further endanger wildlife, particularly large mammals like tigers and elephants. These animals are targeted for their skin, tusks, and other body parts, reducing their already declining numbers.

Climate change, exacerbated by human activity, is another major threat. Shifting weather patterns are disrupting the natural habitats of many species, affecting their food sources and breeding cycles.

Additionally, pollution from nearby industries and human settlements is damaging water sources and poisoning ecosystems. Together, these factors are driving numerous species in the Nilgiri region toward extinction, underscoring the urgent need for conservation efforts and stricter protection policies.

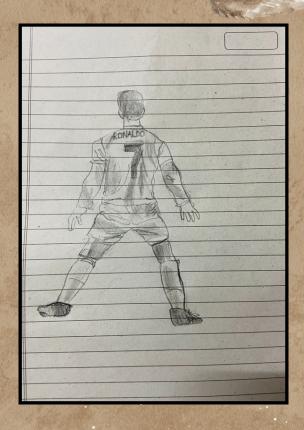

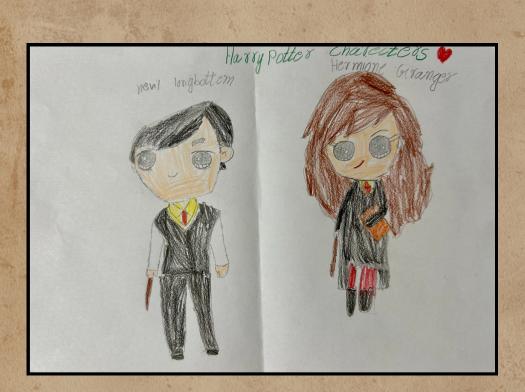
